Ballroom Basix

BALLROOM BASIX™ is a noncompetitive, arts-in-education initiative headquartered in Harlem that is committed to the development of students' social and fitness skills through the fundamentals of Ballroom and Latin dancing. By reinforcing the etiquette inherent in partner dance - rotationally and respectfully - our program instills self-worth, physical well-being and cooperation among all the children it serves. The experience is further enhanced by the history, geography and multiculturalism included in our fun-filled, creative curriculum.

Bond Street Theatre's SHINBONE ALLEY STILT BAND

The Shinbone Alley Stilt Band is a group of multi-talented stilt walking musicians that play an eclectic mix of ol' time swing and dixiland standards as well as modern jazz, ethnic and rock and roll.

Burnt Sugar the Arkestra Chamber

Burnt Sugar the Arkestra Chamber was originally conceived in 1999 by Harlemite Greg Tate as a forum for the New York area improvisational musician to compose, record and perform material, which reflects the breadth and depth of American diasporan music in the 21st century. Burnt Sugar is a sprawling band of musicians whose prodigious chops cover a wide swath of the experimental soul-jazz-hip hop spectrum. Anchored by Jason DiMatteo (acoustic bass) and Jared Michael Nickerson (electric bass), the live version of the group can feature as many as 22 players at any one time.

Clarice Assad

Versatile, sophisticated, and accomplished, Clarice Assad is a sought after composer, arranger, producer, pianist, and vocalist of musical depth and ability. Her music embraces a wide variety of styles, including her own original musical concepts.

Collective Colour Flight 2013

With "make em laugh" as their motto they know just what it takes to keep audiences in their clinches. But big smiles, fancy feet and shuckin' and jivin' may come at a high cost. Last Laugh is a hilarious, at times, shocking character study that exposes the dangerously blurry line between performance and reality.

Evan Shinners

American musician Evan Shinners travels the world performing Bach from pool halls to Carnegie Hall. He has delighted audiences with his stories, songs, and unique renditions of the music of Johann Sebastian Bach. A 2010 Juilliard School graduate. Mr. Shinners was recently featured on NBC TV and National Public Radio performing an allelectric Bach Show at Webster Hall. In December, he was invited to the White House, playing Bach in front of 19,000 people including the First Family for the national Christmas tree lighting.

Gentrifusafication

Director Heather Lanza is a New York City based artist who believes that theatre can and should be a way to open up dialogue as well as a vehicle for change. As both a freelance director and applied theatre practitioner, Heather seeks to engage the communities she is working with through vibrant, powerful, and relevant theatre that sheds light on social issues in new and exciting ways. After receiving a BA in Theatre Directing from Fordham University in 2009, Heather has recently continued her studies, pursuing an MA in Applied Theatre from CUNY's Creative Arts Team.

George Burton | Group 5

Group 5, recently a feature group in the 2013 New York City Winter Jazz Festival creates progressive /modern original music that hinges on jazz influenced by rock. The musicians are master vibe-creators who don't merely walk the genre crossing edge, but rather run it with hard-bashing, rock-infused chords, heavy with swing, mood, and groove.

Kris Bowers was recently featured on Jay Z and Kanye West's album, "Watch the Throne," and won the 2011 Thelonious Monk Competition.

Mabina BanAfrika

Mabina BanAfrika will present is a traditional/ contemporary number rooted in the Kongolese culture by the name of "Sango Te" (which means Nothing New). "Sango Te" takes place in the lands of Congo, and its storyline revolves around the life and actions of a young woman by the name of Suka na Mwana. Suka na

Mwana which means "Woman above all women" is the most beautiful woman in the land; but her heart and way of thinking was corrupted by this gift. At the end she must choose between her self-centered ways and that of which she loves the most. The opening scene: Old village women telling story to Mbongi circle (village circle). The village women sing, dance, and plant/sort their crops.

MADArt Creative Morphing Me II

Morphing Me II, re-imagined for Harlem Arts Festival will be an outdoor version of Morphing Me, which explores the idea of selftransformation in a person - a self-inflicted need of morphing into a new consciousness and understanding of one's self. Morphing Me will feature a performance by America's leading modern trombone collective Guidonian Hand, ASCAP Morton Gould Young Composer Award winner Jeremy Howard Beck (co-commissioning new work In Wait, a preguel to his other work for Guidonian Hand Awakening), and MADArt Creative's resident choreographer Lauren Camp.

Najee Omar Tribute to the Boroughs

Najee Omar promises to deliver praise and funk as he takes the audience on a journey through space and time with his *Tribute to the Boroughs*. Storytelling like no other, this piece uses spoken word to discuss social issues many people face but choose to dismiss. With help from Brooklyn's own DJ Fly Ty, soul singers, and the liveliest band in town, brace yourself for an evening of soulstirring entertainment and inspiration.

Paul Tabachneck

Paul Tabachneck is a singersongwriter based in Harlem. Influenced by Bill Withers, Elvis Costello, and Patty Griffin, Paul calls his music Pop-Folk, because he plays the acoustic guitar and goes for bright soaring melodies. "Most of my material is about relationships, covering the spectrum of all of those introspective moments that crop up, from the giddiness of infatuation to the triumph of finding love, to the frustration of losing it, to the hope of finding it again, and all of the embarrassing stuff that happens in between."

Ricardo Muñiz

Established and widely-exhibited photographer and artist, Ricardo Muñiz, returns to the stage for the Harlem Arts Festival this June in a one-man show with supporting cast. Ricardo will present his new work, The COLOR of my BORICUA VOICE, a silent live body art performance with music, poetry and the voices of the Puerto Rican Diaspora.

The Brandee Younger Jazz Harp Quartet

Younger leads the Brandee Younger Jazz Harp Quartet and recently, has

been most recognized for her intuitive and modern tribute to Jazz harp pioneer, Dorothy Ashby, which has led to her upcoming performances at world class venues across the country including the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. The Brandee Younger Jazz Harp Quartet, with a powerhouse rhythm section completed by drummer, EJ Strickland and bassist, Dezron Douglas with Stacy Dillard on tenor sax sets a musical atmosphere that is both nostalgic and contemporary in its impact.

The Kersten Stevens Experience

Kersten Stevens is an artist whose music strikes a powerful balance between art and sensibility, whose performance is as much an inspiration as it is a transcendent experience. A violinist extraordinaire, Kersten is a three-time Amateur Night at the Apollo winner, a three-time "Showtime at the Apollo" champion. In May 2013, Kersten released her highly anticipated fourth album release entitled INSPIRE ME. Critics have described the album as "Gospel's answer to Jean Luc Ponty... guaranteed to get arms outstretched and waving."

Brian "Raydar" Ellis

Brian "Raydar" Ellis holds a B.M. from Berklee College of Music. He has performed with 7L & Esoteric. 5 ft. (Black Moon), Kev Brown, Mos Def, Renee Neufville, Robert Glasper, Derrick Hodge, Casey Benjamin, and Meshell Ndegeocello. Recordings include Late Pass, Boombox, Egoclapper, and Mr. T's Revenge. He has been published in URB Magazine, Elemental Magazine, The Source, Okayplayer, HHC, and Stealth. Currently he is producing records for hip-hop group the Godbody and Esperanza Spalding and recording an album with Chris "Daddy" Dave.

Di Jeremiah

It was in a refugee camp on the Ivory coast that Dj Jeremiah was first introduced to Fela Kuti and other Afrobeat/Afropop groups and started DJing, playing music on cassette for his fellow refugees, providing a glimmer of hope in a hopeless situation. That experience taught Jeremiah to be strong, and to stay positive, no matter how bleak things might seem. It also affirmed the healing power of music for him. After relocating to San Francisco, in 2002, Jeremiah began to further his DJ career, playing at local venues and starting produced numerous humanitarian benefit shows for NGOs benefitting refuges in Africa and Haiti, and created the annual Afrofunk Festival. Establishing himself as one of SF's most in-demand world

beat DJs, Jeremiah became known as "Mr. Afrobeat," and opened up shows for the likes of Salif Keita, Femi Kuti, Seun Kuti, Zap mama, King Sunny Ade, Alpha Blondy, Konono No. 1 and more.

Brenda Braxton

Brenda Braxton, who is currently starring in COUGAR The Musical, is a native New Yorker and graduate of the High School for the Performing Arts. She was featured on Broadway in SMOKEY JOE'S CAFÉ for which she was nominated for a Tony Award and the recipient of the NAACP Theater Award, Chicago's Jefferson Award and Grammy for Best Cast Album. In 2003, she joined the Broadway cast of CHICAGO in the starring role of Velma Kelly and has enjoyed six years with the company. For her work as founder of LLJFT Ms. Braxton has received the Dr. Martin Luther King "Living the Dream" award given by New York's Governor Pataki, the Josephine Baker Award from the National Council of Negro Women, and the Community Service award given by the National Association of Negro Business Women.

Flo Wiley

Florene "Flo" Wiley is the narrator of the Harlem Is...Music documentary produced by Community Works Inc., and the 2006 Apollo Legends Hall of Fame Awards Tribute Videos. She was the "God Voice" for the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards at the Kennedy Center in 2002 and at Carnegie Hall from 2003 through 2008. A sought after host, she has served as Mistress of Ceremony for Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority Inc., The Wall Street Alphas, The City College of New York, Jazzmobile, and guest co-

host of Apollo Amateur Night. Since 2001, Flo has produced and hosted a weekly radio show, Black Beat New York: The Flo Wiley Show which broadcasts Thursdays from 6pm to 7pm on Harlem Community Radio (WHCR 90.3 FM &www.whcr.org). She is also a member of the WHCR Broadcast Emergency Response Team.

Savona Bailey-McClain

Savona Bailey-McClain currently lives and works in New York City. She is an independent curator, producer and preservation advocate. The range of McClain's practice has included sculpture, drawings, performance, sound, and mixed media. McClain is the Executive Director and Chief Curator for The West Harlem Art Fund, Inc. a fifteen year old public art organization and curatorial collective serving neighborhoods around the city. Her public art installations have been seen in the New York Times. Art Daily, Artnet Magazine, Los Angeles Times, DNAinfo, among others. McClain strives for a soulful, meaningful connection with the public and the "arts". McClain has installed at Times Square, DUMBO, Soho, NoLita, Williamsburg, Governors Island, Queens, Greater Harlem (East, Central and West), Chelsea this past fall and now the Bronx.
